Ephesians 6:1-24

Children obey your parents. God commands this and Paul reiterates this is right. He starts talking to the children first because we develop our first relationship with God

usually through our parents. Then as adults, children of God, we can translate that first level of obedience to our obedience to God. God provides the perfect example of obedience with Jesus. Christ was obedient to God even to death on the cross. In doing so, he honored his father.

Living a life of full obedience all the time is not the easiest thing to accomplish. We disappoint God with our disobedience all the time. Philippians 1:1-26

I'm sure Paul didn't want to be in prison but he wasn't wallowing in self pity about his circumstances. He is thankful that his situation has allowed him to glorify God! He continues to be prayerful and thankful.

I hope that when our life seems or feels stressed and out of control, we can stop and give thanks for who gives us life here on earth, and more importantly – eternally.

Paul is describing joy in suffering. Wait, that doesn't sound right. JOY in SUFFERING?

He found joy in the Knowledge of Jesus Christ and what he had done for him. We have to live our lives in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ. Christianity is not a way of thinking or believing, it is a way of living. Paul was a great example of this and he was constantly telling others of this great joy.

Psalm 73

Philippians 3:4-21

Paul uses this scripture to give his pedigree and his spiritual resumé. He lists things that had been given to him by the nature of his Jewish birth and things he had accomplished by his own efforts. He is not trying to brag about himself, rather, he lists these as things that give him confidence in belonging to God. Paul was surely special to God.

But Paul doesn't consider any of his advantages to be gain. Paul changed his entire value system to be a child of God. The things that used to be his advantage, became a disadvantage. The confidence he placed in his heritage was actually keeping him from Jesus Christ.

Paul understood that to hope in Christ was to consider everything else loss. Christ and

his salvation means everything. How much of a priority in your life is knowing Christ? Do you spend enough time reading your Bible and trying to gain more knowledge of what Christ's love did and can do for us?

What is contentment? This world, it seems, is constantly looking for the next big fix, the thing that they are sure will change their world and make everything better. It seems we are always wanting better jobs, cars, homes, better family life, and more money.

Do these things really make us content? Might I suggest the key to contentment is what we put into our mind and heart? In verse 8, Paul teaches about proper thinking. What do we meditate on? If we are thinking about Christ and His love for us, this might change how we think about our daily walk. In verse 9, Paul tells the Philippian Christians to practice what they had learned, heard, and seen. They needed to think on those things and let them guide their behavior.

Paul does not say to think only positive thoughts. Our world is wrapped up in the idea that if we think positive, then we will have a good life. When we direct our thoughts on what is pure, lovely, commendable, and worthy of our calling – only then can we be content.
