Ezekiel 18:1-19:14

There is a truth that runs throughout the bible that is revealed in our reading today in Ezekiel. Chapter 18 verse 20 says, "The soul who sins shall die." This chapter goes on to tell us that we are all held accountable for our own sin. This is echoed in Romans 3:10 and 3:23. "None is righteous" and "all have sinned."

This certainty of sin hurts God. Ezekiel 18:23 says that the Lord has no pleasure in the death of the wicked; He wants everyone to turn away from sin and live. In the New Testament, Peter tells us that "The Lord is not wishing any should perish, but that all should reach repentance." (2 Peter 2:9)

God loves us so much that He did not leave us to die in our sin. He is so kind that He made a way for us to escape death. This kindness is meant to lead us to repentance (Romans 2:4). When we turn away from sin, we can be saved by God through the blood of His Son. This is the Gospel; it is the power of God for salvation. (Romans 1:16)

April 10th Readings

Hebrews 10:1-17

Hebrews 10 is such an encouraging chapter of the bible! There can be no misunderstanding; the writer puts it in plain language what Jesus has done for us.

Because He was willing to do the Father's will, Jesus sacrificed Himself. By His perfect sacrifice, He did away with the first covenant (the Law) to establish the second covenant—a covenant that perfected for all time those that are being sanctified by His blood.

The Father, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit bear witness to this truth. When we enter into this perfect covenant (through baptism), we, too, are perfected. This does not mean we are perfect but that we are complete. As long as we remain faithful to our covenant, we are not condemned for our sin. Our sin is so far removed from us that God no longer even remembers it.

This is such good news! We should shout it from the rooftops! Thank you, God, for what you have done for us through Jesus!

Have you ever given someone a gift that cost you a lot? To be able to give this gift you had to sacrifice your time, or your money, or you traded something that was very dear to you. But you did this willingly because of your love for the receiver and you were sure they would recognize what it meant to receive this gift.

How would you feel if you later found out that the receiver didn't really appreciate your gift at all? Perhaps they traded it for something else that was worthless in comparison. Or maybe they just didn't take care of it. It could be that they just moved away and left your gift behind. You would come to realize that the receiver of your precious gift just didn't care about your sacrifice or what the gift really meant to them or to you. Would this make you feel disappointed, sad, or angry?

God gave us the most precious gift that was ever given. He sacrificed His one and only Son to give it to us. This gift was the redemption of our very souls from eternal death—what gift could ever compare?

We want so much to have faith, don't we? Because we know that without faith it is impossible to please God (Hebrews 11:6). Moreover, we want to have exemplary faith like those heroes listed in Hebrews 11. So how do we get this pleasing-God kind of faith?
