Sometimes I catch myself saying, "That's not right" or "That's not fair" rather than just doing the task at hand, as though I'm doing it for God. What about you?

## Can One Person Make a Difference? Part 2

When we look at the covenant between God and Abraham, introduced in Genesis 12:1-3, we usually skip to the part in verse 3 "...And in you all the families of the earth will be blessed." I think we are drawn to that part because we know it's a reference to Jesus. And that is certainly true. But there are many blessings that God is going to bestow on individuals as well as groups of people between the time that covenant was made and the time of Christ. In today's reading, Joseph experienced some fulfillment of that Abrahamic covenant at a time before Israel was in the land. Joseph, just one man, the Lord being with him, became successful which in turn caused his master to be blessed. But even during the difficult times, Joseph became a blessing to those around him. Ultimately, Joseph, and his relationship with God, caused Pharaoh to be blessed and eventually the nation of Egypt. So one person can make a difference. As Christians we should be a blessing to work with, to work for, or to work under. We should be a blessing just to be around. The blessing of Christ should be visible in us.

<u>June 20th Readings</u> <u>GENESIS 41:17-42:17</u> <u>MATTHEW 13:24-46</u> <u>PSALM 18:1-15</u> PROVERBS 4:1-6

David, in his psalms, often wrote with simple phrases. And yet those phrases had and continue to have deep meanings and vivid imagery. As in the 23<sup>rd</sup> Psalm. I can always picture the green grass and the still waters. The first three verses of Psalm 18 are no different. The Lord is my strength, my rock, my fortress, my deliverer, my shield, my salvation, my stronghold. I think you get the idea. David is describing a God who is <u>ALL</u> powerful and without limits. The word 'my' is a possessive term and I think David believed in the power of God with all his heart. We as Christians, need to remember that the God of David is also our God. Sometimes I wonder if we don't comprehend this or if we just put limits on a limitless God. Try reading those three verses as you start your day as though they were your words. Think about each descriptive word and how it holds true in your life if you own it. Our God is an Awesome God!

June 21st Readings GENESIS 42:18-43:34 MATTHEW 13:47-14:12 PSALM 18:16-36 PROVERBS 4:7-10

Webster boils the word *wisdom* down to these three words: Knowledge, Insight, Judgment. There was a time when someone seeking wisdom or advice would look to the older members of their family, group, tribe, or even congregation. Mainly because they were well respected and considered to be wise through the lives they lived and the life lessons they had experienced. It doesn't seem to be that way anymore. Today, people seeking wisdom or advice most likely Google it. What the world passes off as wisdom is usually a little bit of knowledge and a lot of opinion and is in line with what that person wants you to believe, not the truth. Which brings to mind several old sayings: *A little but of knowledge is a dangerous thing, The trouble with opinion is everybody has one*, and *You can't all be right, but you can all be wrong*. So what do we do? Wise King Solomon talks about true wisdom and how to use it in Proverbs 4:7-10. He explains that wisdom and understanding go hand in hand. Let us seek the wisdom and the understanding that comes from God and His word for application to our lives.

But if any of you lacks wisdom, let him ask of God, who gives to all generously and without reproach and it will be given to him. James 1:5

Description	Result

Testimony of the Lord is sure	Makes us wise

Commandment of the Lord is pure	Enlightens our eyes

We can have the word of God and know it, but unless we put it to use it will not have its intended results. In verse 11, he tells us there is great reward in keeping them. Let's make God's word a part of our lives so we, too, can say,

Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be acceptable in your sight. O Lord, my rock and my Redeemer!
