October 8th Readings <u>1 Samuel 8:1-9:27</u> John 6:22-42 Psalm 106:32-48 Proverbs 14:34-35

I often look up the definition of words: To be united means to be joined together politically, for a common purpose, or by common feelings.

Just last week, our junior high students loaded an entire trailer full of items they had collected for the Hurricane Harvey victims. October 11th Readings <u>1 Samuel 14:1-52</u> John 7:31-53 Psalm 109:1-31 Proverbs 15:5-7

I love the game of football, but there are many players with big egos. The word ego is defined as a "person's sense of self-esteem or self-importance".
